CIVIL SOCIETY INITIATIVES AND PARTNERSHIPS



Partnerships to Strengthen Civil Society for a Better Quality of Life

A robust civil society is crucial for a country's development and stability. When the private sector and citizens' groups play a role in weaving the social fabric alongside government, citizens are better able to address local priorities and improve their quality of life.

Essentially, civil society is about people coming together with common purpose to benefit society. In developing and fragile states, civil society often plays a central role, supporting and complementing governments to provide services and alleviate poverty. In all cultures throughout history, people often gain meaning and resilience from the bonds of civil society by helping each other.

The Aga Khan Development Network (AKDN), consisting of many locally rooted institutions, approaches civil society from a long history of fostering pluralism, local representation and resilience. The approach sees a need in many countries for public forums based on merit and inclusion. The Network's emphasis has emerged from its values and grown through its work with community-level organizations and savings groups up to national rural support programs, commercial banks and insurance companies. AKDN is involved in a range of partnerships that strengthen and sustain civil society to improve trust, accountability and the quality of life.

ALLIANCES BUILD ON OUR EXPERIENCE

Experience shows that community-driven initiatives based on local assets, capacity and trust have longer-lasting benefits than externally driven development projects. In the 1980s, the Aga Khan Rural Support Programme pioneered AKDN's strategy for building civil society. In the mountains of northern Pakistan, isolated and impoverished communities achieved significant improvements in quality of life when village organizations identified local priorities and mobilized resources from government, donors, and individuals, in their own communities, to address local needs. This generates considerable ownership in improvements that range from infrastructure—including hundreds of irrigation channels to the "soft assets" of over 4,000 community organizations that manage local services and savings totalling millions of dollars. Building and strengthening a responsive civil society enabled communities to improve their own lives.

From the rural support programs, we learned the value of building sustainable, locally led institutions and networks. AKDN continues to work with civil society and governments, at the community level and through national and regional partnerships. A sector-wide approach to bolster civil society at all levels also works to strengthen the enabling environment so institutions can thrive. Today, regional partnerships support select national and community-level efforts of our partners to grow accountable institutions, merit-based leadership, credibility, ethics and trust in all levels of society.

GROWING ASSETS. CAPACITY AND TRUST

A shared approach for a vital civil society focuses on three mutually supportive pillars: Assets, Capacity and Trust. Case studies from Africa and Asia show that these elements anchor people as stakeholders in their own development. As civil society organizations (CSOs) build on local assets (financial as well as other forms), and strengthen local capacity to improve the quality of life, greater trust can form among citizens, that benefits civil society and government. CSOs then become more durable and better able to improve the quality of life for all citizens, whether through service delivery, advocacy, or other activities.

MAKING PARTNERSHIPS WORK

The Aga Khan Foundation U.S.A. (AKF USA) works with partners to ensure effective programs that sustain civil society over the long-term. Sound partnerships involve critical assessment of programs and partnerships that encourage learning among stakeholders. Across these partnerships, we explore where technology can increase the reach and cost-effectiveness of capacity building, complementing local experience and strengthening civil society organizations (CSOs) in ways that foster inclusion and efficient expansion.

AKF USA's alliances demonstrate an international commitment to advance local solutions. Our civil society partnerships currently fall into four areas: strengthening local institutions, participatory governance, learning and research, and innovative financing models. Globally, AKDN has many more partnerships. The following illustrate examples involving the Aga Khan Foundation U.S.A.:
