# Caring for Infants: Healthcare Investment in Pakistan

Dr. Muhammad Sohail Salat heads the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit at Aga Khan University Hospital (AKUH) in Karachi, which re-opened its doors in 2015 after a major expansion. To show the clinic's impact, Dr. Salat introduces a young woman born at the hospital 19 years before: Arisha almost didn't live to her first birthday, but thanks to care she received at AKUH, she now aspires to be a doctor.

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

## Young Readers and an Active Civil Society in Kenya

The Yetu Initiative empowers Kenyans to give voice to their concerns and create their own solutions. Yetu (the name means "ours" in Kiswahili) works with civil society organizations to strengthen their work with communities on local priorities. Muthoni Garland, a prize-winning author and co-founder of a Kenyan non-profit group, believes that a reading nation is a smarter nation. Her organization promotes children's reading through national Read Aloud Days and Start A Library, which aims to put a storybook in the hands of every Kenyan child. "I grew up in a storytelling culture. My grandmother told me stories—she didn't pre-chew them. If the story's good, a child will understand it."

The Start A Library campaign was the first digital fundraising campaign supported by the Yetu Initiative, and it quickly raised enough funds to create more than three school libraries. As important, the campaign cultivated skills in Kenyan civil society organizations for connecting with communities on priorities like education.

A family in Afghanistan's Wakhan region enjoys lighting at home for the first time. A new electric plant has reduced their costs of cooking and provides opportunities for home-based businesses and for students to study after dark. Electricity has energized small-scale industry and pumps for water access.



### Two Communities Join to Light a Better Life

At the flip of a switch, two communities in one of the remotest places on Earth entered a new era. In the Wakhan Corridor, high in the Afghan Pamir mountains, a new micro-hydro power station provides reliable electricity to the residents of these villages over 9,800 feet above sea level. Completed in 2015, the plant is transforming life for people living in the harsh climatic conditions of this area. How these two communities found a way to work together is an important piece of the puzzle.

#### Adapting to Climate Change: Learning with Farmers

Farm families in Africa's Sahel region are among the most vulnerable to climate change and its impact. "Despite the lack of water we often face, people in my village see tree seedlings and tree planting as sources of income," says Mama Coumaré, a farmer in Mali. The investment that Coumaré and other farm families devote to trees in the harsh environment of the Sahara Desert's edge says much about their deep commitment.
