












Farmers have always adapted to change, facing unpredictable weather, shifting markets, and rising costs. Today, pressures on rural communities are increasing, influenced by global economic, social, and ecological factors. Farmers need support to seize new opportunities. AKF's Agriculture and Food Security programs partner with farmers to develop holistic, nature-based solutions that improve food security and livelihoods while caring for the land. For example, the Green Champion program in East Africa trains young people to promote sustainable and regenerative farming among small-scale farms. This approach has a proven ripple effect: as farmers adopt practices that restore soil, improve water management, and reduce pesticide use, both land and communities flourish. The Green Champion program is an example of how AKF's support—especially for women and youth—builds on the natural strengths of agricultural communities, helping them become more resilient than ever.

AKF works to promote environmentally sustainable and gender equitable solutions to food insecurity by promoting biodiverse crops through our regenerative farming techniques.

# **Building Resilience:**

How AKF Supports Farmers with Sustainable Solutions

# **Nurturing Land and People with Regenerative Farming in Kenya**

When Teresia, a smallholder farmer in Kenya, first met Obed, an AKF-trained Green Champion, she was not looking to make any changes. Then Obed told Teresia about the many benefits of regenerative farming techniques, including better health, increased crop yields, and lower costs. She was intrigued. With Obed's guidance, Teresia swapped chemical pesticides for organic methods. The results? Her health improved, her crops flourished, and her income grew. Now, her neighbors are following her example—proving that one empowered farmer can spark a ripple of change across an entire community.







# **Environmental Innovators** in the Kyrgyz Republic

Aida, an AKF Green Champion and former teacher, has invented a way to turn discarded sheep shearings into organic fertilizer. The water-retaining properties of her fertilizing granules make them appealing to Kyrgyz farmers who are struggling with water shortages. She is one of several local innovators whose products have come to market with support from AKF.





# Micro-Forests Help Sustain Family Farms in Afghanistan

After droughts hit northern Afghanistan, Zahra could no longer grow enough food to feed her family or earn extra income at the market. Now, an AKF-supported community micro-forestry initiative is helping restore her livelihood. These tiny forests regenerate soil and preserve water, enabling farmers to grow food, fodder, and high-value produce. This improves food security and makes them more resilient to unpredictable weather.





# **Early Childhood** Development



Studies show that high quality early childhood programs are a sound investment in a child's future, delivering improved learning, health, job opportunities, and social skills as they grow up. Yet, millions of children are held back by poverty, malnutrition, and a lack of stimulating environments, creating gaps that can become more difficult to bridge as a child grows older.

AKF's Early Childhood Development (ECD) programs in Asia and Africa center on empowering caregivers, families, educators, and communities to engage in the development of young children. And, by investing in high quality educational services and strengthening the ECD workforce and institutions, AKF is helping to tackle inequalities, ensuring that all children have the chance to reach their full potential.

AKF believes that educational outcomes are most impacted by a strong foundation. Investing in early childhood development not only enhances learning outcomes, it provides an economic pathway for women in underserved communities.

# Forging a Path to Educational Success

When he was a young boy, Mwinyi attended Rasul Akram Early Childhood Development School in Kwale, Kenya, where his teacher, Bahati, laid the foundation for his education. Using active learning and play, Bahati awakened Mwinyi's love of learning. He later earned a scholarship to an Aga Khan School and is now on his way to university. Mwinyi also volunteers at his former school to help other village children obtain the best start in life. Their story captures the success of the Madrasa Early Childhood Program (MECP) in East Africa.







# **Enriching Precious Family Time**

Siyaram is a day laborer in India and father of six who loves spending free time with his children. Vroom—an early childhood program that AKF runs with the Bezos Family Foundation—helps him make the most of these moments. The Vroom WhatsApp group sends Siyaram simple brain-building activities to share with his children enriching everyday interactions like mealtime and bedtime. Vroom is also underway in Kenya, Pakistan, and Tanzania, helping parents and caregivers nurture children in the all-important preschool years.





# Love and Learning Bridge the Gap

When eight-year-old Hussein enters his classroom at Luwale Primary School in Lindi, Tanzania, his curiosity shines. Not long ago, school felt out of reach. Hussein struggled to keep up, and his mother, Swaumu, feared he would be left behind. Everything changed with support from Schools2030, an innovative collaboration led by AKF and 30 international partners. Swaumu received a practical "learning-at-home" guide, filled with activities tailored to Hussein's needs. With this support, Hussein's confidence and abilities have flourished, sparking a new love of learning.







To be productive, economies need regular infusions of innovative ideas and creative energy. But many potential entrepreneurs who could provide this vitality are excluded. Without business training, experience, or access to credit, their ventures struggle to get off the ground.

AKF supports dynamic entrepreneurship programs across Africa, Asia, and the Middle East—focusing on empowering youth and women—to drive economic growth and social change. AKF's initiatives are co-constructed with private and public sectors and blend skills development, mentorship, and low-interest financing to help owners of micro, small, and medium-sized businesses grow at their own pace.

Equipping aspiring entrepreneurs with the tools and resources to succeed catalyzes inclusive, sustainable growth, breathing new life into local economies.

# **Empowering Women** to Educate the Future

When Ayperi opened her kindergarten in her small town in Sokuluk, Kyrgyz Republic, it was the culmination of a dream to provide local families like hers with affordable, high-quality early childhood education. An AKF-supported business incubation program provided the springboard she needed. The program's dual goal is to foster women entrepreneurs and establish quality early childhood education centers in rural areas. Now, Ayperi's preschool is a vibrant community hub, and has created jobs and a brighter future for local children and families.





# **Seed Loans and Support for Afghan Entrepreneurs**

Microfinance is an essential piece of the economic puzzle in Afghanistan, where small businesses are the backbone of the economy. With access to a small loan from the AKDN's First Microfinance Bank-Afghanistan, Rahmatullah (in blue) was able to purchase supplies for his business in Kabul and increase both sales and revenue. His is among 35,500 enterprises AKF, in partnership with the World Bank, aims to reach through a program designed to promote small business ownership, especially among women and youth.







# Passion Channeled Into a Thriving Business

Ayana dreamed of a career in beauty. After mastering hairdressing and makeup artistry, she still lacked business acumen and access to capital. Through a pitch competition, she won a spot in AKF's Youth Entrepreneurship and Employability Skills program with Osh State University in the Kyrgyz Republic. Business training, mentorship, and seed funding gave Ayana the boost she needed to turn her skills into a thriving business. With the right support, she's not just earning a living—she's building a future.

This year, Zoha turned 9 years old—an event made even more special by her decision not to have a birthday party. Instead, Zoha asked her family to donate what they would normally spend to AKF USA.

She was inspired by the story of Hussein, a boy close to her age in Tanzania who used to struggle to learn. Thanks to an innovative AKF and Schools2030 "learning-at-home" program, he was able to catch up and join his friends in school (see page 15).

"He was struggling but was eager to learn and needed extra help to get better at reading and math," said Zoha.

The spark of hope in Hussein's story got Zoha thinking about how she could help other children. "Their lives could be like mine if they were given the same opportunities and support," she added.

Zoha's family participates in local and global fundraising initiatives, but this was her first solo effort, and she felt genuinely empathetic.

"We're very proud of Zoha and that she thought about helping another child," said her mom, Laila.

The joy of helping others has Zoha bubbling with ideas to get other kids involved. A community youth chess tournament or a fundraising walk and run could be on the horizon, because as far as Zoha is concerned,

"Yes! Kids can change the world."

### HONORING OUR FOUNDER

His Highness Prince Karim Al-Hussaini, Aga Khan IV, 49th hereditary Imam of the Shia Ismaili Muslims and descendant of the Prophet Muhammad (peace be upon him), passed away peacefully in Lisbon on February 4, 2025, aged 88, surrounded by his family.

His Late Highness founded what is today known as the Aga Khan Development Network (AKDN) more than 50 years ago. Its purpose is to improve the quality of life of those in need—regardless of origin, race, gender, or religion—through efforts in health care, education, habitat, culture and the creation of economic opportunity. Today, the AKDN is active in more than 30 countries, with a particular focus on some of the most disadvantaged parts of Asia and Africa.

# **National Committee**

The National Committee assists the Board of Directors in the discharge of its functions. All National Committee members are appointed by the Board.

The Committee fulfills key governance and oversight responsibilities for Aga Khan Foundation USA, including: providing ongoing general guidance; compliance with legal and fiscal requirements; and overseeing the annual budget so that resources placed under its custody are productively managed, invested, and used in furtherance of its best interests.


